No one wants to leave their pets behind in a disaster so you need to be prepared

Simple steps that can help keep your pets safe every day:

- Ensure your pets are microchipped and registered
- Ensure your pets wear collars and tags at all times
- Include a secondary contact number on your pet's ID tag or microchip record



Practice your plan

Make sure that you and your pets can move quickly in a disaster. Practice with your pet(s) going in and out of a carrier, or walking on a lead/harness. Get your pets familiar with emergency contacts who might have to help you and your pet in an emergency.



Having a lead/harness or carrier for each pet will help you move quickly and ensure that your pets are safe and can be handled in an emergency situation. Have a spare is a great idea too!

Think about your pet's special needs that you may have to prepare for. Know where you can take your pets in an emergency and make those arrangements before a disaster happens.





Making arrangements now for someone to be able to your pet to safety if you are not home when disaster strikes can keep your pet safe and will reduce your need to put yourself in danger to help your pet.
